An Introduction to Ergonomic Risk Assessment



This short course is suitable for practitioners including managers, supervisors, safety officers and occupational health professionals who may be assessing work activities which involve manual handling and/or repetitive tasks involving the upper limbs. The course has a particular emphasis on the 5-step risk assessment process.

Please note that this course is intended to raise awareness and provide an overview of ergonomics and its relationship to the risk assessment process.

The course is not intended to replace the workplace specific information and training needs required by health and safety legislation and it does not denote competency in ergonomic risk assessment. Specific training and / or specialised advice may also be required.



Enter Course



An Introduction to Ergonomic Risk Assessment continued







Observe the task. Consult with those who do the task, Collect information on how the task is carried out. Identify the key stages of the task. 0 Take physical measurements, including details of the load being handled and the work environment, for example, the height of work table and distance from the floor to the top of a pallet. Use weighing scales to determine the actual weight of the load. Gather other Use the relevant risk assessment tool - MAC, ART or RAPP, Complete the tool's score sheet information. The score sheet will indicate the level of risk for each of the criteria and this information will identify whether there are any high-risk ergonomic issues to be addressed. The employer has a duty to put appropriate measures in place to avoid or reduce the risk of injury. Appropriate measures will address the risk factors in a practical and effective manner Carry out a review to ensure that the recommended improvements have been implemented and that they have addressed the identified risk factors.

Occupational Safety and Health when Remote Working

- Section 4 of the Assessment Checklist includes a section on a workstation assessment which includes Display Screen Equipment (DSE) and work equipment.
- It is important to ensure that adequate controls are in place to reduce the risk of musculoskeletal disorders (MSDs).




Short Courses on Workplace Safety
